Brief History:

Ira D. Bird built this house. According to Frances Umphress Bird, Donald Bird added the limestone to this house in the early 1970s. The late Donald Bird learned his craft from older masons, and honed it restoring buildings on Granbury's courthouse square, including the Granbury Opera House.

Architecture, Craft of Donald Bird

Description of Resource:

Frame construction, limestone veneer—stone laid in “puzzle” pattern with some pieces protruding from wall, creating a two-dimensional effect
